## **Cooperation and Coordination with APEC and ABAC**

The annual APEC Voices program is organized and operated in cooperation and coordination with the APEC Secretariat, the ABAC Chair, the ABAC host committee, the Official APEC Host Committee, and the APEC CEO Summit. Following APEC's guiding principles of consensus and flexibility, the APEC Voices Leadership Council works with all these offices and officials to plan the annual APEC Voices Program in the way that works best for the APEC Host Economy and the supporting organizations, events and venues, so as to provide the APEC-engaged learning experiences for our students and educators.

The Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) is a regional economic forum established in 1989 to leverage the growing interdependence of the Asia-Pacific. APEC's 21 members aim to create greater prosperity for the people of the region by promoting balanced, inclusive, sustainable, innovative and secure growth and by accelerating regional economic integration. APEC ensures that goods, services, investment and people move easily across borders. Members facilitate this trade through faster customs procedures at borders; more favorable business climates behind the border; and aligning regulations and standards across the region.

The APEC Business Advisory Council (ABAC) was created by the APEC Economic Leaders in November 1995 to provide advice on the implementation of the Osaka Action Agenda and on other specific business sector priorities, and to respond when the various APEC fora request information about business-related issues or to provide the business perspective on specific areas of cooperation. ABAC comprises of up to three members of the private sector from each economy. ABAC members are appointed by their respective Leaders, and represent a range of business sectors, including small and medium enterprises. The economy determines the term of membership of each appointee as well as its own administrative arrangements and staff support.

## History of the APEC Voices of the Future Program

The Voices of the Future was launched in Kuala Lumpur in 1998 at the APEC Malaysia Summit.

Since then, the Voices of the Future program has gone from strength to strength. The program is enriched by the APEC Host Committees, ABAC Chairs and ABAC Members, and the APEC CEO Summits in New Zealand (1999), Brunei (2000), Mexico (2002), Chile (2004), Korea (2005), Vietnam (2006), Australia (2007), Peru (2008), Singapore (2009) and Japan (2010). In 2010, the Voices of the Future was renamed the APEC Voices of the Future. The APEC Voices of the future continues to be held in conjunction with the APEC Leaders' Week in the USA (2011), Russia (2012), Indonesia (2013), People's Republic of China (2014), The Philippines (2015), Peru (2016) and Vietnam (2017)

The Voices Leadership Council and its permanent Co-Chairs were first organized in the VOF New Zealand of 1999, and grew with the addition of the Voices of the Future programs in the APEC Economies of China, Mexico and Singapore.

In 2005, New Zealand Voices inaugurated the first mid-year preparatory Voices program for all interested New Zealand students and educators, inviting visiting Voices delegations as well. Mexico Voices also expanded its annual preparatory calendar and joined in the Kiwi mid-year schedule.

In 2007, China Voices inaugurated the most extensive preparatory program to date, which has been implemented in more than 100 campuses throughout the vast APEC Economy.

Later in 2008, during the Voices of the Future program in Peru, the planning for the APEC Voices program and Secretariat in Singapore began, in coordination and in cooperation with the Singapore Voices and Singapore's APEC Host Year.

In 2009, over 120 delegates attended the annual Voices of the Future program in Singapore from 9 to 15 November 2009. Main topics of discussion were the current issues affecting the APEC Economies such as economic recovery, support for multilateral trading systems, and regional economic integration.

In 2010, over 100 delegates from 17 APEC Economies participated in the Voices of the Future program in Yokohama, Japan, from 8 to 14 November 2010. APEC Voices delegates were given the opportunity to meet and interact with APEC Leaders, Ministers and business leaders during the APEC week.

In 2011, more than 120 APEC Voices of the Future delegates attended the APEC Voices Program in Honolulu, USA, from 7 to 13 November 2012. One of the highlights of the event was a dialogue with H.E. Francisco J Sanchez, Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade, U.S. Department of Commerce. Delegates also discussed security issues in the Pacific Rim with Admiral Patrick Walsh, Commander of the U.S Pacific Fleet. Such platforms provided the youth delegates with an overview of the various issues faced by the region and how youth leaders can play a role in finding solutions for these issues.

## **History of the APEC Voices of the Future Program**

In 2012, the APEC Voices Leadership Council sent a small group of 15 APEC Voices Representatives from 16 APEC Member Economies to Vladivostok, Russia, from 2 to 9 September 2012. The APEC Voices delegates were invited by the Russian Host Committee to engage APEC Leaders, Ministers and business leaders during the APEC CEO Summit. It was an enriching experience for many youth leaders who were in Russia for the first time.

In 2013, APEC Voices delegates were in Bali, Indonesia, for the APEC Voices Program from 2 to 8 October 2013. Voices delegates were privileged to have a dialogue with H.E. Gita Wirjawan, Trade Minister of the Republic of Indonesia, on the challenges faced by Indonesian youth and Indonesia's role at regional and global trade scene. Additionally, APEC Voices delegates were also honored to meet H.E. Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono, President of the Republic of Indonesia, at the Bali Convention Centre during the APEC CEO Summit 2013.

In 2014, the APEC Voices was held in Beijing, People's Republic of China, from 5 to 11 November 2014. More than 116 APEC Voices delegates from the 16 economies attended the program. It allowed delegates to experience a rich cultural immersion through visiting historical sites including the Great Wall of China and Forbidden City. More importantly, it also allowed interactions with local youth and participation in the APEC CEO Summit.

In 2015, the APEC Voices was held in Manila, Philippines, from 12 to 19 November 2015. It was first time for the Philippines to host the APEC Voices program. Main topics of discussion were ways to enhance the regional economic integration, fostering the participation of SMEs in regional and global markets, investing in human capital development and building sustainable and resilient communities.

In 2016, the APEC Voices was held in Lima, Peru, from 14 to 20 November 2016. It was Peru's second time hosting the APEC Voices program since 2008, the year they last hosted. More than 120 youth participants and educators engaged in discussions with business leaders and government officials on issues such as advancing regional integration and growth, developing human capital, enhancing the regional food market and the modernization of MSMEs in the Asia-Pacific.

In 2017, the APEC Voices of the Future was held in Da Nang, Vietnam, from 5 to 11 November 2017. APEC Voices delegates of the 21 APEC economies was able to discuss with business and economic leaders under the theme of "Creating New Dynamism, Fostering a Shared Future."

This year, the APEC Voices of the Future will be held in Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea. In conjunction with the APEC Voices 2018 Program, the APEC Voices Leadership Council will also launch the 20th Anniversary of the APEC Voices of the Future Commemorative Book.



## Logo Interpretation

The logo is designed in line with this year's theme of "Harnessing Inclusive Opportunities, Embracing the Digital Future."

The logo, which resembles a sun, signifies a new era of the younger generation of leaders embracing change in this modern world of technology. The cone shell in most Papua New Guinean cultures signifies calling of great meetings to communicate important messages to the general public. In this context, it signifies a call out to the world's promising next leaders to take ownership of change. The seashell also represents the Oceanian Economy of Papua New Guinea, and the exotic natural environment in this beautiful island nation.

Red, black and yellow are the colours of the Papua New Guinean flag, since this is PNG's first time ever to host the world's APEC Summit, the colours symbolise their identity and hospitality to all the APEC member economy states.

### National Youth Achievement Award (NYAA) Council, Singapore



The National Youth Achievement Award (NYAA) Council seeks to develop and maximize the potential of young people through service learning, respect for the environment, healthy living and community leadership initiatives so that they may be exceptional individuals who can contribute effectively to society and the nation.

Currently, more than 300,000 young people in Singapore have participated in the NYAA's youth development program.

The NYAA Council Singapore plays a significant role in hosting the APEC Voices Secretariat and helping to organize the annual APEC Voices Program with the support of the APEC Host Economy.

### Virtual Trade Mission Foundation (VTM) International

Based in Washington DC, the Virtual Trade Mission Foundation International has played a prominent role in the annual APEC Voices conference since 1996.



VTM's focus is to foster education and communication among students, educators, business leaders and the media on the United States' involvement in the "New Global Economy".

Through VTM, the "APEC Voices of the Future" program was implemented. VTM invites students from APEC Member Economies to participate in the annual APEC CEO Summit and APEC Business Advisory Council (ABAC) meetings. Students conduct interviews, visit trading facilities, and interact with one another, in realisation of VTM's purpose, which is to expose students to a variety of cultures as well as to create knowledgeable "citizen diplomats" from the APEC Economies.

## Our Partners



### ExxonMobil PNG

The PNG LNG Project, operated by ExxonMobil PNG, is the largest ever investment in Papua New Guinea and is responsible for some of the most significant and widespread economic development of recent years.

The US\$19 billion PNG LNG Project, is an integrated liquefied natural gas (LNG) operation with gas production and processing facilities that extend from Hela, Southern Highlands, Western and Gulf provinces to Port Moresby in Central Province.

ExxonMobil has a 33.2 percent interest in the project, with co-venturers Oil Search Limited, 29 percent; Kumul Petroleum Holdings Limited, which is the PNG State's official nominee for its equity interest, 16.8 percent; Santos Limited 13.5 percent; JX Nippon Oil & Gas Exploration 4.7 percent; and Mineral Resources Development Company Limited, a 100 percent State-owned company, 2.8 percent. The Papua New Guinea State and landowners together represent a 19.6 percent share in the Project.

The PNG LNG Project is tapping natural gas reserves from multiple fields spread across almost 200 kilometres. 700 kilometres of onshore and offshore pipeline were built to connect a new gas-conditioning plant in Hides and liquefaction and storage facilities northwest of Port Moresby.

ExxonMobil is doing more than developing the gas resources of Papua New Guinea, it's also developing people and capacity, and creating and delivering long-term benefits to local communities.

## Our Partners



### ExxonMobil PNG

ExxonMobil PNG engages with communities and local businesses to develop long-term partnerships that build strength, resilience and capacity in communities so that the benefits of PNG LNG are passed on to future generations.

- Around 2,600 people are responsible for operating the PNG LNG Project, 82 percent are Papua New Guinean and 22 percent are women.
- Since 2010, ExxonMobil PNG has spent over US\$5.2 billion on services provided by Papua New Guinean companies. Of this, US\$1.3 billion has been spent with landowner companies.
- Twelve landowner companies and some 200 Papua New Guinean businesses are engaged by ExxonMobil PNG.
- US\$360 million has been invested to build infrastructure, develop social programs, and enhance skills and knowledge to improve the quality of life for the people of Papua New Guinea.

## PAPUA NEW GUINEA



Papua New Guinea has a population of over eight million people, with more than 800 different language groups from over 1,000 tribes. A country of immense cultural and biological diversity, it's known for its beaches and coral reefs, active volcanoes, dense rainforest and hiking routes.

Port Moresby is the capital of Papua New Guinea and is located on the Gulf of Papua. It has a population of close to a million people and is growing. Places of interest to visit are the National Museum and Art Gallery which includes masks and carved wooden poles. Nearby, the Parliament House is modelled on a traditional house, with its entrance dominated with colourful mosaic featuring national motifs.

Other places of interest are the Port Moresby Nature Park in the city, and Port Moresby Adventure Park where various species of plants and animals are housed, which is a 20 minutes' drive out of the city.

## PORT MORESBY



Port Moresby is the capital and largest city of Papua New Guinea (PNG). The city is on the shores of the Gulf of Papua. Its population is around 300,000 and growing quickly. The indigenous people of the area are the Motu-Koitabu. Moresby, as it is commonly known, got its name from Captain John Moresby who arrived in 1873 as the first European visitor.

The city is quite spread out. The original colonial settlement was by the sea and this is still the port area, as well as the main business and banking district. On the hills above are upmarket residences. Closer to the airport, separated from the original town by hills, is Waigani, a 1970s development built to house the Government offices of the newly Independent (September 16, 1975) country of Papua New Guinea. Nearby are the housing areas of Boroko and Gordons, which also contain most of the large stores.

Port Moresby is the main point of entry into Papua New Guinea for air-traffic and most of the boat-traffic.

### Port Moresby Nature Park

Port Moresby Nature Park (formerly the National Capital Botanical Gardens) is Papua New Guinea's leading botanical and native zoological parks and gardens, showcasing the best of PNG's flora and fauna. The park is home to over 250 native animals including birds of paradise, tree-kangaroos, cassowaries, wallabies, snakes, crocodiles, hornbills and multiple parrot species.

The grounds also offer a lush change from the hustle and bustle of Port Moresby City with the only rainforest tract within the Capital City, and the only place in the world to showcase all three species of cassowaries in a world-class boardwalk and display facility. Thousands of tropical plant species including palms, gingers, heliconias and native timber tree species are found within the grounds.

## PNG LNG PROJECT LNG PLANT



The LNG Plant is located 20 kilometres northwest of Port Moresby, at Caution Bay on the south coast of PNG's Central Province.

The LNG Plant receives natural gas from the Hides Gas Conditioning Plant through a 700-kilometre pipeline.

The LNG process involves removing impurities and cooling the gas down to a temperature cold enough to turn it into liquid form. Once achieved, the LNG moves to specialised storage tanks. From there, the LNG goes through a pipeline connected to the jetty where it loads onto LNG carriers. These ships then export the LNG to the international market.

In 2017 the operations produced 8.3 million tonnes of LNG, an increase of 20 percent from the original design specification of 6.9 million tonnes per annum.

Condensate, a low-density mixture of hydrocarbon liquids recovered through the gas liquefaction process, is also stored and loaded onto tankers for export at the LNG Plant.

Main LNG Plant facilities include:

- Two LNG process trains
- Two 160,000 cubic metre LNG storage tanks
- Marine loading terminal for LNG tankers up to 215,000 cubic metres
- Camp facilities, including accommodation and amenities, administration office medical centre, emergency helipad and sports and recreation centre.

## USEFUL INFORMATION

### Weather

Papua New Guinea weather conditions mainly consist of two seasons throughout the year. The wet season starts from October and continues until the end of March. The dry season from April to September. The weather temperatures range between 23°C (73°F) and 32°C (90°F). It is very warm in Port Moresby, so you may want to bring some light cotton attire.

### Local Time

The time zone in Papua New Guinea is UTC+10. The standard time in Port Moresby is UTC/GMT + 10 hours.

### Currency

The legal tender in Papua New Guinea is the PNG Kina, approximate exchange rates value the Kina at US\$1 = K3.30. Major hotels do not have currency exchange facilities, nor are there many avenues to change money within the city. Therefore, delegates are encouraged to use the money change facility available at the Jacksons International Airport upon entry.

### Credit Cards

Major International credit cards such as American Express, Visa, Diners Club and Master Card are accepted at hotels, retail shops, restaurants and ATM's.

### Tipping

Tipping is generally not practiced. But good service in hospitality venues may be rewarded.

### Electricity

The national supply is 240 Volts, 50Hz. Power outlet pins are Type 1 (the same as Australia and New Zealand).

### Water Supply

Tap water in Port Moresby is World Health Organization certified, and bottled water is available at hotels and will be provided at the meeting venue.

### Telecommunication Services

Sim cards can be purchased from local mobile service providers (Digicel, Bmobile, Vodafone, and Telikom) from their kiosks available at the Port Moresby International Airport and in shopping centres.

### Dress Code

The dress code for the meetings is business attire unless otherwise suggested on invitations for specific events. It is recommended that participants bring appropriate light tropical clothes to wear outside of the meetings.

## DO'S AND DONT'S IN PNG

### DO'S

- Delegates are able to go to the main shopping mall in their free time using a reliable taxi service. These are the nominated taxi services to use, City Loop Taxi and Premium Taxi services.
- Be respectful and polite to those who are older than you and be sensitive to their opinions.
- Have a respective approach in voicing an opinion or discussing a problem. There are customs of a community the person comes from; a general respectful and sensitive approach is recommended.
- Be modest with dressing, modesty is expected on a general note especially in Public places.
- Be content with what is available and enjoy the experience of meeting new people.
- If you need to try out local food, it is advisable to let an official know to assist you with your needs.
- You can take pictures of people but always seek permission first, Papua New Guineans are highly conservative.

### DO NOTS

- Please avoid using the term Cannibals, or Kanaka this is regarded as offensive and derogatory even if you are joking.
- While you do make great friends with Papua New Guinean counterparts, it is best to avoid criticising their country too heavily. Most Papua New Guineans are very patriotic in nature.
- Do not use public transportation such as catching a local PMV Bus for your own safety.
- Do not walk around public places you are unfamiliar with at night
- Do not mock the way a local speaks English even if you are joking.

## **The June Mayne Gould Leadership Award for APEC Voices of the Future**

June Mayne Gould began her Asia Pacific journey in Golden Square, Bendigo, Australia, in 1919. She was the second child of a family grown from two generations of miners, who worked in the Australian gold mines, and teachers, who came to help build the schools and churches in this booming town that helped build the State of Victoria.

Growing up in Port Melbourne, June soon found she had the call of the sea in her heart and trained for surf lifesaving, receiving many certificates and awards for her achievement. All these and more led her to travel in Oceania and the greater Asia Pacific as an adult, settling in Long Beach, California, a major port town like Melbourne, to raise her family.

Although June did not have a formal education herself, due to the lack of family finances and the onset of the second World War, the home schooling and mentoring she received from her grandmother, aunt and mother, who were all top teachers in their towns, made her a keen observer of world events and a constant and vigorous encourager of all those around her to do their best. She was always happy to help people in need. Throughout her 30 plus years as a retail manager in the States, June mentored many young female executives who, like her, rose through the ranks of the large department store chain they worked for.

June's generosity in letting her son, Noel Gould, Founding Member and Co-chair, APEC Voices Leadership Council, use a good portion of her modest retirement savings to help develop the Voices of the Future for APEC, helped to establish the program's first years in Malaysia (1998), New Zealand (1999) and Brunei (2000). Thanks to the financial contribution of June, the Voices of the Future for APEC has gone from strength to strength and is known today as APEC Voices of the Future.

The June Mayne Gould Leadership Award for the APEC Voices of the Future, which was launched at the APEC Voices 2011 in Honolulu, is named in honor of June Mayne Gould for her immense contributions in the development of youth leaders in the 21 APEC Member Economies and will be presented annually to an outstanding student who has demonstrated sincere, positive, encouraging, helpful character and leadership throughout the APEC Voices Week, greatly contributing to the program by helping other students do their best and get the most out of their APEC experience.

The recipient of the June Mayne Gould Leadership Award will receive an APEC Voices Scholarship, where the award winner will have the opportunity to participate in the following year's APEC Voices program.
